• Favourite spot Probably the south-side of the island, which starts with the drive there, with its beautiful view of the water. There are many beaches, the village community of SHEK O (left), and plenty of food and haggling for deals at STANLEY MARKET. If surfing is your thing, go to BIG WAVE BAY, my favourite. • Satisfying meal A great place for good Japanese-style deep-fried pork cutlet curry is CURRY BEE in Causeway Bay (524 Jaffe Rd). This is Japanese comfort food. CRYSTAL JADE, also in Causeway Bay, has Shanghainese food and dumplings (below, inset) to die for. • Hidden treasure BIG WAVE BAY BEACH in SAI KUNG, not to be confused with Big Wave Bay in the south. To get there, you have to either take a two-hour hike or go by boat. It is very isolated and the cleanest beach in Hong Kong. • Best music YUMLA (79 Wyndham St.; below right), a cosy bar, where the music knows no boundaries. With different DJs and genres every day, it's the place for the open-minded music lover. VOLAR in Central (38-44 D'Aguilar Street) is roomier, with more commercial music; it's good for dancing.

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• View The PEAK. On a clear day, you get a view of the whole city and the harbour, and the tram that takes you up is also entertaining. • Must-have experience A ride on the STAR FERRY, which was the way people used to get to the other harbour (Kowloon side) before there was a tunnel to drive through. • Get-away The BOTANICAL GARDENS, which is five minutes away from Central. There is also a zoo, which is quite surreal, being literally in the middle of the city. I like to visit the orangutans or zone out there with my iPod. • Market On the Kowloon side, near Mong Kok, is the LADIES MARKET (far left). Don't let the name fool you, it's not just for ladies. You'll find a large selection of clothes, toys and goods at great prices. Be prepared for crowds, though.
